Walking



If the 84 mile Hadrian's Wall National Trail is not for you, there are numerous well-marked walks within easy reach of stations along the Tyne Valley Railway.

Try one of the walks around Haltwhistle, wander through Allen Banks, take a stroll by the River Tyne at Hexham or walk from Bardon Mill to the Sill National Landscape Discovery Centre or Roman Vindolanda.

Talkin Tarn

A 30 minute walk will take you from Brampton Station to Talkin Tarn, which offers lovely walks, water sports and great place for everyone to enjoy.

Sporting Activities

Have you considered travelling by train to watch your favourite sporting event— be it Newcastle United or Carlisle United, a local rugby team or horse racing at Carlisle, Hexham or Newcastle?

Travel Beyond the Tyne Valley Railway

If you are looking for days out by train from Tyne Valley Railway country, there is lots of choice. Here are a couple of ideas.



Change at Carlisle and travel

along the scenic **Cumbrian Coast Line** and take a trip on the 'La'al Ratty' Ravenglass & Eskdale Railway or enjoy the spectacular views from the **Settle-Carlisle Railway**.

History and Heritage

The Tyne Valley Railway provides great opportunities for exploring the 1900 years of **Hadrian's Wall**, a UNESCO world heritage site.

The area has had a turbulent past being the home of many Border Reivers. Some of their fortified bastles can still be found at Haltwhistle. You can explore the Norman and medieval castles at Prudhoe, Newcastle and Carlisle. One of the first purpose built prisons in the country survives in Hexham. The Old Gaol (circa 1330) is open to visitors during the summer months.

Innovation at the Heart of our Railway

Planned by the Newcastle & Carlisle Railway Company (formed in 1826), the railway opened in sections and was fully opened in 1838.

Renowned railway innovators are associated with the area.

George Stephenson, was born at Wylam, as was Timothy Hackworth. Stephenson's standard gauge of railway continues to be used today throughout the world whilst Hackworth is known for his pioneering work in production of early locomotives with William Hedley, manager of Wylam Colliery. You can walk from Wylam Station to Stephenson's birthplace.



In 1836, **Thomas Edmondson** was employed as stationmaster at Milton Station (later renamed Brampton).

He went on to design a new railway ticket and ticketing system which was adopted by rail, shipping, bus and aviation companies worldwide.

Trains and Tickets

Numerous trains run daily along the Tyne Valley Railway. Times can be found online or ask at a booking office.

Choose from a range of tickets—singles, returns, duos, advance purchase singles. Prices will depend on the journey, time of travel and type purchased. Some ranger and rover tickets, available from booking offices, include travel on the Tyne Valley Railway. If you have a railcard, this can save you money on the cost of the ticket.

More information to plan a journey and buy tickets can be found at railway booking offices or online. There are staffed booking offices at Carlisle, Hexham and Newcastle Stations with ticket vending machines on all Tyne Valley Railway stations for purchase of tickets prior to travel. You can add local bus travel to some tickets. Plusbus at Carlisle, Hexham, Newcastle and other towns and cities can be included on your train ticket.

Great Places to Visit

Carlisle

With a visit to this compact city, you can relive history.



The pedestrianised city centre is within easy walking distance of the railway station. Here you will find a unique mix of independent retailers and great high street brands. The Lanes Shopping Centre is an ideal all weather destination. In the award winning Victorian Market Hall there is a great mix of stalls.

Be amazed by some of the city's wonderful street art.

Haltwhistle

Renowned as being at the very centre of Britain, the town is full of independent shops, with quality local food and friendly, knowledgeable hospitality.

Visit the 13th Century church with its links to the town's Celtic and Roman past and see the stained glass windows by William Morris.



Or if you fancy a stroll, follow the Bastle Trail or walk the Burn through 10 million years of earth's history. There are four family activity walks allowing you to discover some of Haltwhistle's rich history: Up the Burn; Round the Town; Off the Rails or Tanky's Trail. For a longer walk, try out the six-mile Hadrian's Wall circular walk. During summer months, the 3 outdoor heated swimming pools are a great place for some family fun.

Hexham

Described by writer Bill Bryson "as handsome a market town as you will find anywhere" Hexham has recently been voted one of the happiest places to live.



Hexham has something for everyone. Fascinating history, incredible architecture, icons including Hexham Abbey and the Old Gaol, interesting shops, an array of eateries and pubs,

great events, a vibrant theatre and cinema, it is within easy reach of Hadrian's Wall and Northumberland National Park, home to England's cleanest rivers, clearest air and darkest skies.

For those seeking some activity, enjoy scenic walks and cycle routes on the doorstep, two golf courses, rowing, canoeing and kayaking on the River Tyne, or use for sports facilities at the leisure centre and pool.

Corbridge

Originally a busy Roman town, Corbridge maintains a distinctive character. With secret streets and courtyards, awardwinning independent shops, cafes, pubs and restaurants that



frequently feature on television and in newspapers and magazines both in the UK and across the world, it is well worth a visit.

Explore the Roman town, now run by English Heritage, and see a time capsule of Roman life and the fascinating remains of the their streets.

A short stroll from the railway station and village centre is the oldest surviving bridge across the River Tyne, overlooking beautiful river walks.

Wylam

Wylam was at the heart of the evolution of rail travel and is unique in having been the home of some of the world's most notable railway pioneers, George Stephenson, Timothy Hackworth and William Hedley. Visit the Railway Museum and George Stephenson's birthplace.

MetroCentre

With easy access from the its own railway station, one of the biggest shipping centres in Europe offers more than just a retail experience. A cinema, entertainment for all the family and a choice of restaurants, cafes and take-away food makes for a great day out.

Newcastle and Gateshead

Newcastle is a vibrant city with its neighbour, Gateshead on

the other side of the River Tyne, there is wonderful shopping, a huge range of places to eat and drink, sporting, theatre and music events, museums and much more.





With visitors arriving by sea and air, it is a gateway to the north of England and Scotland for many international travellers. The Tyne Valley Railway is a great way for them to explore the more rural parts of our area.

Hadrian's Wall Country

Built to guard the wild northern frontier of the Roman Empire in AD122, Hadrian's Wall was more than just a barricade; it was a vibrant and multi-cultural occupied military zone of mile-castles, barracks, ramparts, forts and settlements; sprawling almost 80 miles in length from the North Sea to the Irish Sea. The building of the Wall required vision and an outstanding level of engineering skill.



1900 years later the Wall, set amongst the wild beauty of Cumbrian and Northumbrian landscapes, still impresses and stands as a testimony to the power and reach of the mighty Roman Empire.

You can travel by train from stations throughout the country to the heart of Hadrian's Wall Country.

Some Roman attractions and sites are accessible on foot—with walks from Corbridge, Haltwhistle and Bardon Mill Stations.

The Hadrian's Wall Country Line Day Ranger is a great ticket allowing rail travel between Sunderland and Whitehaven giving you lots of options to hop on and off



the train to explore Hadrian's Wall country.

You can take the bus from Hexham or Haltwhistle Stations to various sites along the Wall and the Sill National Landscape Discovery Centre.
